**Strategic Directions for Global Education at Wayne State University
Draft Report for Distribution at the 3rd Annual Global Forum
March 1, 2001**

The Office for Global Education has over the past six months conducted strategic planning for Wayne State's global agenda. Students, faculty, administrators and other interested parties have been consulted. Significant input has come from the previous two Global Forums sponsored by the Division of Academic Affairs. Your feedback is invited as we move from strategic planning to implementation. We propose that Wayne State's global mission be informed by the following vision statement: "Wayne State University graduates will possess the knowledge, skills, attitudes, values and experiences to excel in a rapidly changing global environment." Four strategic directions for global education should guide global education planning and implementation during the next five years.

1. Providing students with meaningful international experiences . . .
 - Add two international study trip programs each year through 2006.
 - By 2006 there will be 500 Wayne students who annually participate in study experiences outside of the United States.
 - Increase international students enrolled at Wayne State by 10 percent per year until 2006
2. Increasing Wayne State involvement in prestigious international programs such as Fulbright . . .
 - By 2006 Wayne State administrators and faculty will have visited 20 Fulbright offices worldwide.
 - By 2006 Wayne State will have 25 scholars and students on Fulbright awards.
3. Internationalizing the curriculum . . .
 - Provide 15 curriculum internationalization innovation grants for faculty each year until 2006.
 - The Office for Global Education, in cooperation with other appropriate units such as the Office for Teaching and Learning and the College of Education will in 2002 convene a special conference devoted to curriculum internationalization.
- 4) Developing a supportive campus culture/environment for global education . . .
 - The Office of Global Education will develop and implement a communication plan to inform the campus community about global activities.
 - The Office for Global Education will conduct a periodic "Globally Connected" dialogue program and an annual Global Forum.
 - The Office for Global Education will work with other units to bring to campus a major international speaker each year beginning in 2001.
 - The Office for Global Education will work with the Division of Student Development and Campus Life, the Office for Governmental and Community Affairs and other appropriate units to sponsor an annual ethnic fair on campus beginning in 2004.

Overview:

In April of 1999 the Council of Deans endorsed a report on global education titled "Recommendations for Advancing Excellence in Global Education at Wayne State University: A Report on the University Forum on Global Education." The report recommended inclusion of the following vision statement in the mission of Wayne State University: "Wayne State University graduates will possess the knowledge, skills, attitudes, values and experiences to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing global environment." Twenty-nine recommendations in the following six areas were proposed: 1) Advancing the global vision and mission; 2) Promoting student learning; 3) Promoting partnerships; 4) Establishing a global education network; 5) Actions by divisions, schools, colleges, and units; 6) Promoting global awareness through campus life.

In January of 2000 the Office for Global Education was established within the Office of the Provost in the Division of Academic Affairs. Headed by an associate provost and staffed with a full time special assistant to the provost for global education, the Office for Global Education has undertaken numerous initiatives to advance global education at Wayne State. Key activities include administering a global grant competition for faculty, coordinating international travel for Wayne State delegations, administering a grant competition to support Wayne State students in study/internship programs outside of the US, greeting international visitors to the Wayne State campus, and coordinating agreements between Wayne State and universities outside of the US.

The Office for Global Education has engaged in strategic planning for the past six months. A variety of groups and individuals have been consulted: students, faculty, alumni, business leaders, administrators, consul generals, global education leaders at other universities in and outside of the US and others.

Guiding Vision:

Enabling students to become effective citizens of the world is a core responsibility of a university. Drawing upon the institution's strengths of diversity and location, the following vision statement should guide the development of global education initiatives at Wayne State University:

Wayne State University graduates will possess the knowledge, skills, attitudes, values and experiences to excel in a rapidly changing global environment.

Note that the vision statement focuses on outcomes, excellence and change.

Priorities:

"Recommendations for Advancing Excellence in Global Education at Wayne State University: A Report on the University Forum on Global Education" proposed numerous initiatives and strategies to enhance global activities at Wayne. Several of the proposed initiatives are already in progress. Groups and individuals that have reviewed the document feel that the report provided great breadth but did not offer a clear strategic direction for global education.

To provide focus and direction, we recommend that global education at Wayne State University focus in four areas: 1) providing students with meaningful international experiences, 2) increasing Wayne State involvement in prestigious international programs

such as Fulbright, 3) internationalizing the curriculum and 4) developing a supportive campus culture/environment for global education.

1. Providing students with meaningful international experiences — A semester or year abroad is the hallmark program of most campuses that emphasize international experiences for students. Wayne State University is internationally known for its Junior Year in Germany program at which undergraduate students from Wayne and throughout the US spend a year at the Wayne State campus in Munich, Germany. While such a program provides invaluable experience, it can serve only a small proportion of the Wayne population. Our campus must find ways to enable students who work, have families, are enrolled in graduate programs and lack the financial resources to participate in rigorous international study programs. Carefully planned short-term study trips outside of the US built upon faculty sponsorship and a rigorous curriculum involving pre-trip, trip and post-trip academic activities is an ideal way to increase the involvement of Wayne State students. Such programs may combine with internship and service learning opportunities and emphasize ethnic and cultural ties in our community and workplace. Increasing the number of international students on campus will also provide students and faculty with important experiences that promote cross-cultural and intercultural understanding. Three goals are proposed:

- Add two international study trip programs each year through 2006.
- By 2006 there will be 500 Wayne students who annually participate in study experiences outside of the United States.
- Increase international students enrolled at Wayne State by 10 percent per year until 2006.

2. Increasing Wayne State involvement in prestigious international programs such as Fulbright — The Fulbright Program is the US government's flagship exchange activity. Since the program's inception in 1946, more than 85,000 US Fulbrighters have taught, studied or conducted research in 140 countries around the world. Fulbright is open to a variety of participants including students and faculty. Visiting scholars and students from outside the US enrich the campus experience for our students and faculty; Fulbright awards to our students and faculty enable them to study, teach and research outside of the US, enriching their academic experience and advancing the international reputation of Wayne State. Two goals are proposed:

- By 2006 Wayne State administrators and faculty will have visited 20 Fulbright offices worldwide.
- By 2006 Wayne State will have 25 scholars and students on Fulbright support.

3. Internationalizing the curriculum — The curriculum provides the basis for most students to gain the knowledge and skills needed to excel in a rapidly changing global environment. The Division of Academic Affairs will work with faculty and departments to support curricular change that advances the institution's global mission. Faculty will be encouraged to incorporate innovative approaches in their classes to help students acquire the knowledge, skills, attitudes, values and experiences to excel in a rapidly changing global environment. Two goals are proposed:

- Provide 15 curriculum internationalization innovation grants for faculty each year until 2006.

- The Office for Global Education, in cooperation with other appropriate units such as the Office for Teaching and Learning and the College of Education will in 2002 convene a special conference devoted to curriculum internationalization.
4. Developing a supportive campus culture/environment for global education — The campus needs to develop a global "mindset." The campus community is enriched by the presence of international visitors, cultural events, international speakers and colloquia focusing on international issues. Four goals are proposed:
- The Office of Global Education will develop and implement a communication plan to inform the campus community about global activities.
 - The Office for Global Education will conduct a periodic "Globally Connected" dialogue program and an annual Global Forum.
 - The Office for Global Education will work with other units to bring to campus a major international speaker each year beginning in 2001.
 - The Office for Global Education will work with the Division of Student Development and Campus Life, the Office for Governmental and Community Affairs and other appropriate units to sponsor a major ethnic fair on campus beginning in 2004.

Key activities include administering a global grant competition for faculty, coordinating international travel for Wayne State delegations, administering a grant competition to support Wayne State students in study/internships outside the United States, serving as the protocol office for international visitors, coordinating agreements between Wayne State and universities outside the U.S.

Thursday, March 1, 2001*

During the past two years WSU's international student and visiting scholar population has increased by 29%. WSU has to close to 3,400 international students and scholars representing more than 90 countries. This places us within the top 20 institutes in the country.

Students

Fall 2000 the international student enrollment was 2,762, representing 93 countries. The top five countries represented are:

During academic year 1999-2000 WSU had 599 scholars representing 52 countries. This represents an increase of 26% over a two-year period.

Highlights of some the major activities in each of these areas include:

OISS

- provides assistance to international students and scholars in important matters related to immigration regulation compliance, including the processing of immigration petitions with the Immigration & Naturalization Services
- assists University departments in the hiring of foreign national employees
- provides a comprehensive orientation program for all international students which focuses on:
 - Housing information
 - University Registration procedures
 - Introducing them to U.S. Culture
- provides information to students and scholars on:
 - Banking
 - Health insurance
 - Safety issues
 - Immigration regulations
- provides a number of social and recreational programs during the academic year including:
 - The International Coffee Hour (bi-weekly)
 - The International Fair (annually)

The Student Program Activities Office

The University has 17 ethnic or cultural groups that are recognized student organizations. The student council omnibus fee funds many of the events for these groups.

Study Abroad Resource Center

Located in the University Advising Office in Helen Newberry Joy. The center offers brochures, posters and other reference materials for various programs and in a variety of countries. A Study Abroad Advisor is available to discuss WSU and non-WSU study abroad opportunities and how the programs might suit the students' general education requirements. The Advisor also works closely with a financial aid officer to help students identify sources of funding for study abroad.

The Office for Global Education invites applications for grants to support participation in study/internship programs outside the United States. The purpose of this grant program is to assist Wayne State students in gaining the skills necessary to succeed in a global environment and to gain a greater understanding of the world in which we live.

Preference will be given to the following:

- Programs sponsored by Wayne State University
- Programs affiliated with Wayne State University
- Programs that grant academic credit

This application is for student study/internship programs outside the U.S. taking place between June 1 and December 31, 2001. Award notification will occur on or about April 6, 2001.

Please note that any grant awarded shall be awarded based upon the program applied for in this application. Once awarded, grants are not transferable to other programs. Awards will only be given to students applying for programs that have an instructional/internship component. Awards must be used in the allotted time.

Applicants must submit a one-page essay. This essay should include a compelling argument as to why you should receive an award. You should also include information on the program and how your participation in the program will impact your current or future study. Additional attachments include program costs and a program/course/internship brochure or description.

In most cases, awards range from \$250 - \$1500, depending on length of program and quality of application. It is important to note that relative to the entire cost of a program, a grant will in most cases only cover a small portion of the total expense. Students with exceptional financial need should investigate other avenues of support in addition to this grant.

All awards will be administered through the Office for Scholarships and Financial Aid. That office will transfer funds to the student's tuition/fees account after the student has demonstrated proof of enrollment in the program/course/internship.

All awards are subject to the rules governing financial aid. Any questions as to whether an award will affect your financial aid should be directed to the Office for Scholarships and Financial Aid.

Grants are given to as many students as possible. Funds are limited and all students who apply will not receive an award. Due to the volume of applications, students who have received previous awards may apply again, however, will only be considered after other awards have been granted.
